

Questions to Ask About Medications

Getting information you want to know

Below are examples of questions to ask if a doctor recommends or prescribes a medication for you. Check off questions you want to ask your doctor. Add other questions you want to discuss. You may want to share a copy of this with your provider.

Take this list with you to your next appointment. You may want to give a copy to your doctor. Listen carefully and keep a record of what you find out. Take notes or bring a friend to take notes for you. Using a tape recorder will allow you to listen to the answers again later. If something is unclear to you, or if you want more information, do not be afraid to ask. Your doctor may not be able to answer every question, but can help you find the answers.

About this Medication

What is the full name of this medication? How do you spell it?	How will I know if it is working for me? How long will it take?
Is there a generic name for this medication? How do you spell it?	Will I need blood tests or other regular check-ups if I use this medication?
Do you have printed information about this medication I can have?	Could I become addicted or dependent on this medication?
What does this medication do? How will it help me?	How do I know if the dose should be changed or the medication stopped?
Why are you recommending this medication to me?	
About Options	
Are there different ways to take this medication such as pills, shots, or patches? Should I consider these?	What other medication might be helpful to me? Why are you not recommending them for me at this time?
About Dosage	
What is the exact dose you are recommending?	What happens if I forget to take a dose at the right time?
How often and when should I take this medication?	
About Side Effects	
What are the risks of using this medication?	If I experience side effects, what should I do?
What are the side effects of this medication?	What are some of the ways to manage these side effects?



Mixing This Medication With Other Drugs

- Are there any restrictions if I take this medication (such as avoid certain foods or not drive)?
- What happens if I drink alcohol while using this medication?
- What happens if I use marijuana or other street drugs while using this medication?

About Cost (If the doctor does not know about costs, ask who does)
